Know Your Rights During ICE Encounters

Your Constitutional Rights

Everyone in the United States has rights under the Constitution, regardless of immigration status.

If ICE Comes to Your Door:

- You do not have to open the door. ICE cannot enter your home without a valid judicial warrant signed by a judge or your permission.
- Ask to see a warrant. If they say they have one, ask them to slide it under the door or show it through a window.
- Check if it's a judicial warrant. A valid judicial warrant must be signed by a judge and have your correct name and address.
- ICE administrative warrants (Form I-200 or I-205) do not give agents the right to enter your home.

If ICE Stops You in Public:

- You have the right to remain silent. Say "I am exercising my right to remain silent."
- You can refuse to show identity documents. Ask "Am I free to go?" If yes, calmly walk away.
- Do not lie or provide false documents.
- Do not run or resist arrest.

If You Are Detained:

- You have the right to speak to an attorney. Say "I want to speak to an attorney."
- You have the right to make a phone call.
- You do not have to sign anything without speaking to an attorney first.
- You do not have to answer questions about where you were born, your immigration status, or criminal history.
- You have the right to refuse to take DNA samples or participate in line-ups without a lawyer present.

Document Important Information

Keep the following information in a safe place that family members or trusted friends can access:

• Names and contact information of family members

- Medical conditions and medications
- Emergency contacts
- Names and contact information of any attorneys
- Copies of immigration documents
- Location of birth certificates, passports, and other important documents

Make a Family Preparedness Plan

- Designate trusted adults to care for your children if you are detained
- Talk to your children about your plan
- Make sure emergency contacts have necessary documentation to pick up children from school
- Keep important documents organized and accessible to trusted family members

Remember

- Stay calm and do not resist
- Document everything that happened as soon as possible
- Report raids or arrests to local immigrant rights organizations
- Seek legal help immediately if detained
